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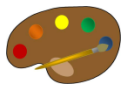

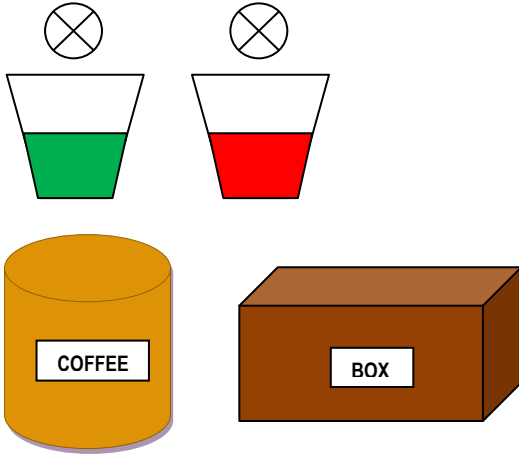

Day #1



Art Activity



Holiday Marble Painting: Set up the art table with white paper, a large empty box or large coffee can, red and green paint, marbles (use golf balls for younger children), gold and silver glitter, and plastic spoons and cups. Pour paint into separate cups and place spoons and marbles in each cup. Lay paper on the bottom of the box and use a spoon to take a marble from the paint and drop it on the paper. Shake the box or the can back and forth. Continue for as long as the child would like. Take the paper out and sprinkle glitter over the wet paint.



Circle Time

Establish a Circle Time routine. Read The Gingerbread Man by Catherine McCafferty. Provide children with flannel pieces of all characters in the story or simply print out pictures. Laminate. After reading the book, start the discussion by asking children to retell the events of the story using the props. They can name the characters and recall events in the story or simply describe their favorite part of the story. Write their responses on chart paper.



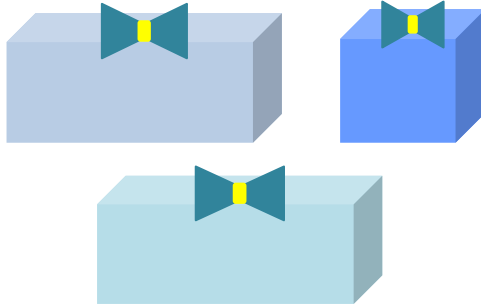
Science Activity

This activity can be done at Circle Time. Find the shape of a gingerbread man. Trace and cut out several gingerbread men silhouettes from sandpaper. Provide children with cinnamon sticks, cloves, vanilla scent, etc. and encourage the children to rub the sticks or drop the scent on the gingerbread silhouettes. Let children sniff the scent. Write down their responses.



Dramatic Play

Create a "Gift Wrapping Center." Supply this area with wrapping paper, colored tissue paper, bows, ribbons, glue (use tape for older children), empty boxes, etc. Help the children wrap the boxes and decorate with bows or ribbons.



Writing Center

Provide markers, crayons, pom-poms, glue, stamps, stickers, and sandpaper cutouts of the gingerbread man. Encourage the children to draw on and decorate their cutouts.



Movement

Freeze Dance: Play holiday songs on a CD player or a computer. Instruct the children to dance or sing along until the music stops. Then they should freeze and move when music starts again.



Snack Idea

Holiday Wreath Jell-O Mold: Use a Jell-O or baking mold for this activity. Make green and red Jell-O separately following the box instructions and pour one mix into the mold. Place the mold in the refrigerator for fifteen minutes or until it becomes hard. Add the second Jell-O mix on top and refrigerate until it sets. Place cherries or pineapple chunks around the Jell-O wreath. Serve this colorful edible wreath as a snack.
